

# MESSAGE TO OUR MEMBERS

**A**t Nodak Electric Cooperative, every year tells a story. The story of 2025 is one of resilience, responsible decision-making and the strength that comes from working together as a cooperative.

Last summer, our region experienced severe storms that caused widespread damage across our service territory. High winds and significant weather events resulted in infrastructure loss substantial enough to qualify as FEMA-declared events. In the face of those challenges, our crews responded with urgency, professionalism and an unwavering commitment to our members. Long hours and difficult conditions did not deter them from restoring power safely and efficiently. Their work reflects the very best of the cooperative spirit — neighbors serving neighbors.

Safety remains foundational to everything we do. In 2025, Nodak Electric earned a rare distinction from the Rural Electric Safety Achievement Program (RESAP) for exceptional improvements in safety performance — an honor that has only been awarded to one other North Dakota cooperative in the past. This recognition is not about a single milestone; it represents a sustained commitment to building a culture where safety is embedded in every task and every decision.

Financial stewardship was also a key theme throughout 2025. For eight consecutive years, Nodak Electric maintained stable rates. However, continued increases in wholesale power, materials and operating costs made a rate adjustment necessary in 2025. This decision was made carefully and deliberately, with a long-term view of maintaining system reliability and financial strength.

Members will see another rate increase in 2026, though it will be considerably smaller. Our approach is measured — making responsible adjustments when needed to ensure we continue delivering reliable service without compromising the cooperative's financial health. Thoughtful planning today helps avoid greater challenges tomorrow.

Even in a year that required a rate adjustment and significant storm recovery efforts, Nodak Electric remained financially sound. In 2025, we posted a net margin of \$5 million after deferring \$1.7 million in revenue to offset part of the 2026 wholesale power cost increase. We are also proud to retire \$3.4 million in capital credits to our members in 2025. Returning capital credits is a tangible example of the cooperative difference. Because we operate at cost, margins are allocated back to you — our member-owners — over time. It is a model built on local ownership, transparency and long-term stewardship.

Beyond delivering electricity, Nodak Electric continues to invest in the communities we serve. Through youth programs, scholarships, economic development efforts and community engagement, we continue to invest in the future of rural North Dakota. Our Operation Round Up program allows members to voluntarily round up their monthly electric bill to support local individuals and organizations in need. The collective impact of those small contributions is powerful. It is cooperation in action and a direct reflection of the values that guide us.

Reliability continues to be at the core of everything we do. Investments in infrastructure upgrades, vegetation management and system improvements strengthen our distribution system and position us to meet growing demand. Our responsibility is to ensure the grid remains reliable, resilient and capable of meeting future needs. Strategic planning today ensures we are prepared for tomorrow.

While every year tells a story, 2025's narrative is written by our people — from the dedicated employees committed to excellence, the board members who provide steady governance and the members who place their trust in this cooperative every day.

As we look ahead, our focus remains clear; deliver safe, reliable power, maintain financial strength, support our communities and preserve the cooperative values that define us.

Thank you for your engagement, your trust and your continued support of Nodak Electric Cooperative. We are proud of what was accomplished in 2025 and confident in the path forward.

## MINNKOTA POWER COOPERATIVE


### Generation/Transmission

The source of our energy can be found at the generation point. Our power supplier, Minnkota Power Cooperative, provides energy from western North Dakota coalfields, prairie winds and the mighty waters of the Missouri River. At times, that power portfolio also includes member-owned distributed energy resources as well as energy purchases from the greater electric grid. After power is generated or purchased, it travels over a robust system of high-voltage transmission lines until it arrives at Nodak's substations.

## NODAK ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE

### Distribution System

Once power is stepped down at Nodak's substations for safety, it then travels over Nodak's well-maintained distribution power lines to arrive at farms, homes and businesses in our region. If an issue ever does arise, we have teams at seven service centers spread throughout our territory to ensure a speedy resolution.





# CANDIDATES FOR BOARD OF DIRECTORS



**Cheryl Osowski** (DISTRICT 1)

**Cheryl Osowski** was first elected to the Nodak board of directors in 2017. Osowski earned a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Minnesota – Crookston. **Gordon Mohn** (DISTRICT 2 | 1-YEAR TERM)



# OPERATION ROUND UP®

## BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Operation Round Up is a program that rounds up members' monthly electric bills to the next whole dollar amount. The resulting funds are put into a special account to assist others in need. The funds collected through Operation Round Up are used for a variety of projects, programs and items throughout the Nodak service area.

The Operation Round Up board meets quarterly and considers each application that has been received since the previous meeting. It awards funds to the applicants based on how well the application fits the original funding guidelines: 1) Individuals or families in crisis; 2) Services – ambulance and fire; 3) Community youth needs with emphasis on permanent benefit; 4) Scholarships with emphasis on reeducation of displaced agricultural people; 5) Senior needs with emphasis on permanent benefit; and 6) No requests for funding of utility and space heating energy will be accepted.

Operation Round Up is a voluntary program with roughly **51%** of the **15,307** members participating. Since the program started, a total of **\$1,213,037** has been distributed to individuals and organizations throughout the Nodak service area.

## WATCH THE WIRES

Watch the wires. The idea seems easy enough.

But when you're rushing to plant or get the harvest out of the ground, you might forget about those power lines on the field's edge.

Take a moment to talk to your team about how to avoid equipment contact with power lines and poles – and what to do if contact occurs.

The reminder could save a life.

## IF YOU HIT A POWER LINE OR POLE:

**1** Stay inside the cab

**2** Call 9-1-1

**3** Wait for responders

## WHY YOU SHOULD WATCH THE WIRES:

Last year, the Nodak Electric Cooperative team responded to **more than 40 incidents** of vehicles, farm machinery and contractor equipment hitting or damaging co-op power poles and lines. These cases are not only expensive to repair, but incredibly dangerous to those behind the wheel or at the scene.

In an effort to reduce the number of public incidents involving electric infrastructure, Nodak and its power partner, Minnkota Power Cooperative, are asking members to slow down and be aware of the power lines around you – both overhead and underground. **And if contact DOES occur, remember to stay inside your vehicle and call 9-1-1.** The vehicle and ground could be energized.
