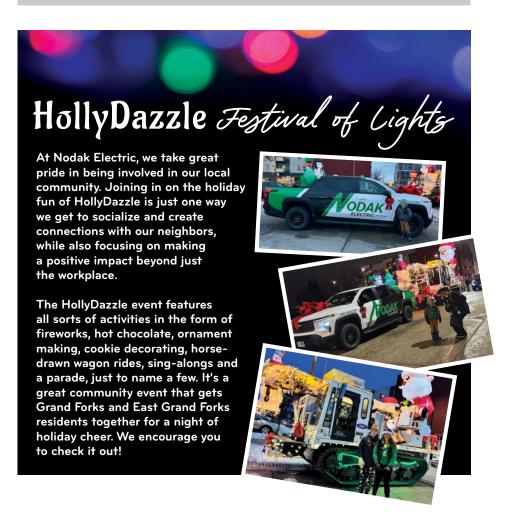
Members who desire to serve as a member of the Nodak board of directors may be nominated in one of two ways:

Warsaw PNA celebrates 80 years of Polish pride

olish heritage is alive and well in northeastern North Dakota, and it was on full display on Nov. 8 in the small communities of Minto and Warsaw. Traditional dress, dance and dinner filled the Minto Community Center, where more than 225 people gathered for an invite-only 80th anniversary celebration of the Warsaw Polish National Alliance, the only PNA lodge in the state.

The festivities began with a Polish mass at the nearby St. Stanislaus Catholic Church in Warsaw, North Dakota, from which attendees headed to the Minto Community Center to experience authentic Polish foods – like kielbasa, pierogies and stuffed cabbage - and traditional Polish dancing. The dancers, both children and adults donned in genuine Polish clothing, are from the area and are trained with the help of event organizer and lodge secretary Sandy Schuster, who has been involved with the local PNA for 45 years. Schuster noted that the Warsaw PNA dancers have a long history of entertaining crowds both locally and across the country. Many past dancers and lodge members returned home for the Nov. 8 event, coming from as far away as Minneapolis.

"The dancers, the alumni that came back, they care about it so much," Schuster said. "Some of them spent many hours and years dancing."

The treasurer of the national PNA based in Chicago was a special quest of the event. He shared words of appreciation for all the

Warsaw Lodge has done for the local Polish community, from offering student scholarships to continuing the traditional dance program. In fact, Schuster was specifically acknowledged with a national award for her dedication to continuing to teach young Polish dancers over several decades.

The evening concluded with live music from Kenny & The Classics, as lodge members and their friends and families danced and reminisced over 80 years of Polish pride. Schuster says she hopes the next generation will continue to carry the torch of the Warsaw PNA for years to come.

"It's like a labor of love when you have a passion for something," she said. "And that's what I would say about it for me."

Quietly powering reliable service

or more than a decade, Nodak's Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) system has improved accuracy, efficiency and outage response across our electric system.

A proven foundation

Over 15 years ago, Nodak Electric began installing AMI – advanced meters that communicate across the same power lines that deliver electricity to your home or business. This power line carrier (PLC) technology doesn't rely on radio or cellular signals. Instead, it sends encrypted data directly over the existing power lines, allowing Nodak to collect readings and monitor voltage from our office.

Though invisible to most members, AMI has quietly transformed daily operations — reducing field time, improving billing accuracy and helping us maintain reliable service for over 20,000 meters.

Supporting outage management

While member phone calls remain the first step in reporting an outage, AMI data plays a key supporting role once those calls come in. When a section of line is reported out, AMI readings help us confirm the outage location and later verify that power has been restored to each individual service.

This partnership between member reporting and AMI technology means faster confirmation, fewer follow-up calls, and greater confidence that every meter is back online before crews move to the next location.

Accuracy and efficiency every day

Before AMI, crews manually read every meter each month, a time-consuming, weather-dependent task. Today, readings are securely collected through the PLC network, ensuring accurate billing and eliminating estimated reads.

The same system helps identify voltage fluctuations and equipment irregularities, providing early insight into potential issues and improving long-term system reliability.

Looking ahead

After 15 years, AMI continues to be one of Nodak's most valuable tools — a steady, proven technology that keeps operating costs low and service reliability high. As analytics and software continue to advance, we'll keep using AMI data to make smart, data-driven improvements to the system that powers your home every day.





WATCH THE WIRES

THIS HOLIDAY SEASON

The time has finally arrived to create a winter wonderland in your yard for the holidays! But before you pull out all your lights, signs and inflatable reindeer, be sure to create a decorating plan that puts safety first. Always remember to WATCH THE WIRES.

STAY 10 FEET AWAY FROM OVERHEAD POWER LINES.

If you are using a ladder to hang lights or are raising large décor like poles or pre-lit structures, look up and around for wires. Electricity can arc from lines if you get too close.



NEVER ATTACH DECORATIONS TO POWER POLES OR UTILITY EQUIPMENT.

Signs and lights do not belong on power poles; nails or staples can damage the pole and cause problems for lineworkers. And no one should be touching the green utility equipment in your yard except for trained professionals. Stay away!



IF ANY DÉCOR IS GOING IN THE GROUND, CALL 811.

Even though your ground stakes, sign poles or posts for inflatables seem like they won't go too deep, there's always a chance you could hit an electrical line or other utility line. Call 811 a few days before you decorate to have the area flagged for lines.
